# Chairman's Report - Gillian Arney

#### Treasurer's Report - John Wallis

Treasurer's Update Report since 31 March 2003

The increase of £5833 is £1467 higher than for the same period last year. Although total funds now stand at £33,025 I expect these to fall below £30K by the end of the current financial year due to winter projects being carried out at the Museum and Watermill.

# Museum

- 1. Admissions increased from £2.50 to £3.00 for Adults and from £1.00 to £1.50 for children. In addition school party fees increased from 50p to 75p per child with no opening fee and supervising adults free of charge.
- 2. Donations. Opening fees were treated as donations. Filming not so good this year.
- 3. Sales share reduced from 100% last year to 25%
- 4. Grant from 'Awards for All' scheme towards cost of furniture for the New Room. (Heritage Lottery Fund.

At the last committee meeting changes were discussed regarding the membership subscription of the society. The proposed changes would be:-

We will abolish the family membership, so a single membership would be £6.00 for the year, and the concessionary (OAP's) fee will be put up to £5.00.

This entitles the member free entry to the Museum or Watermill on all open days.

Gill clarified the Family membership change to the members.

Membership changes proposed by Jeannette Wallis seconded by Gaynor Wiseman and carried, with one vote against this proposal.

It was proposed to accept the Treasurer's accounts.

Proposed Sue Lipscomb and seconded Peter Keeley and carried.

#### **Museum Report – Norman Groom**

The usual maintenance is continuing although a lot of effort is now going into restoration. At the last open day we took over £1200. the best ever, I believe.

I would like to thank Val Rayner for all her efforts in organising the crafts at the museum, and also thank Gill for her continuing work cataloguing photos. Hoping to put on to disc at some point, they then could be sold at the Museum on Open Days.

Helen Hickson has been doing her job as Catering Manager for yet another year, although we have reduced her work load to some extent.

Peter has been continuing with the electrical rewiring.

# Watermill Report - David Lindsey

# 1. Visitors 2003 to date

- (1) <u>General public</u>: The mill was open on fourteen afternoons between Easter Monday and end of September. There were 799 visitors making an average of 56 each afternoon. This is nearly 5% more than last year.
- (2) Sales: Gross takings (excluding flour sales) were £990, a decrease of 3% on last year.
- (3) <u>School parties</u>: To date 1600 children plus 150 teachers (provisional figures) visited the mill. 70% came from Dell Farm and Chiltern Study Centre.
- (4) Adult parties: only two but 51 visitors.
- (5) Milling: Five millings producing 232 bags of flour nearly 7 cwts.

#### 2. Major Events

- (1) <u>2 January 2003</u>: After torrential rain for almost 24 hours, the millpond flooded onto the field and water could scarcely pass under the road bridge. Water was spraying from the pentrough into the mill. Stop boards used to stem flow, water levels had subsided by next day.
- (2) <u>March</u>: Paul Jellis drained the millpond to have it deepened to improve the habitat for the new fish. Opportunity taken to repair the dam wall (cement rendering) and to plug the breach below the wall made in 1980. The dam's integrity is now assured.
- (3) <u>25 August</u> (Bank Holiday): At the end of milling, pitwheel wedges came loose and pitwheel shifted on the wheel shaft. No major damage done but two new pairs of wedges were required made by Mike Bickerton. After seven weekends' work the pitwheel was (apparently) successfully repositioned and re-wedged.

(4) 1 November : During a 'milling training' session, the wedges again came loose after a short time of milling. Decision made to ask a millwright to complete the work. David Nicholls, from Mapledurham has visited to assess and will do the work post Christmas.

#### 3. Normal Work

- (1) Sealing the waterwheel buckets has continued (slowly) using Acropol very expensive but very successful.
- (2) Siphon valve has been replaced by a new one donated by Paul Jellis. The siphon is now working well.
- (3) The tail race arch has been repaired by Roy Cutler, the brickie.
- (4) Replacing the gable shutters has now begun.
- **4.** Registration: The Executive Committee agreed at its meeting on 2 October that the mill should secede from the registration scheme. A letter has been sent to ReSource advising them of this decision. After 31 December therefore, the mill will cease to be a registered museum. Those wishing to see the detailed reasons can obtain a copy from the Secretary.

# 5. Future events

- (1) The mill is participating in the exhibition 'Tring's Local Mills' to be staged by The Tring & District Local History & Museum Society in the Victoria Hall, 28 and 29 November in association with the town's 'Victorian Fiesta'.
- (2) A 'Breadmaking' (by machine or in the oven) evening has been organised jointly by the Ivinghoe & Pitstone W.I. and the Watermill for Tuesday 13 January 2004 at 8.00pm in the large room at Pitstone Memorial Hall (admission £3.00). The Speaker is Stanley Gauvain, Cereals Director of the Campden and Chorleywood Food Research Association.

#### 5. MEETING

#### d) Quorum

The quorum for a meeting of the Society shall be 10 member or 10% of the total membership whichever shall be the less (including representatives of corporate members).

#### New version

"The quorum for a meeting of the Society shall be 10 members or 10% of the total membership, whichever shall be the *greater* (including representatives of corporate members)."

# 11. AMENDMENTS

The Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds majority of members present at an annual or special general meeting, provided that 10 days notice of the proposed amendment has been sent to all members. No amendment shall be made which would have the effect of causing the Society to cease to be a charity in law.

# New version

- "(1) Subject to the following provisions of this clause the Constitution may be altered by a resolution passed by not less than two thirds of the members present and voting at a general meeting. The notice of the general meeting must include notice of the resolution, setting out the terms of the alteration proposed.
- (2) No amendment may be made to clause 1 (the name of the charity clause), clause 2 (the objects clause), the new personal interest clause, clause 12 (the dissolution clause) or this clause without the prior consent in writing to the Commissioners.
- (3) No amendment may be made which would have the effect of making the Charity cease to be a charity at law.
- (4) The Executive Committee should promptly send to the Commission a copy of any amendment made under this clause."

#### 3.

New 'personal interest' clause

#### Executive Committee Members not to be personally interested.

"Except with the prior written approval of the Charity Commission, no member of the Executive Committee shall acquire any interest in property belonging to the Charity (otherwise than as a trustee for the Charity) or receive remuneration or be interested (otherwise than as a member of the Executive Committee) in any contract entered into by Executive Committee."

(Taken from our model Constitution (GD3), 1998)
